FROM THE CANTOR

I was in the supermarket the other day thumbing through magazines while waiting to check out some groceries. It seems every editor was trying desperately to make

sure that I have a great year in 2011. There was the article with 62 ways to get healthier, one with the 101 best recipes for the new season; Oprah was willing to share 50 ideas to make 2011 my best year yet, and then there were the impressive 175 tips and tricks for improving my life. It was, for the most part, the usual, expected advice on the usual, expected subjects. Now the truth is that we all pretty much know what we need to focus on to have a better year. We just don't necessarily follow through, so it could be helpful to have these reminders while the groceries are being bagged.

You might be wondering whether I have my own personal list of things to focus on in the coming year. I do, and I would share them, except that for the most part the items on my list are not all that original, so you might be better off reading some of those magazine articles instead. But permit me, if you would, to mention just two thoughts that are unlikely to appear in any checkout counter periodical and that might contribute to making 2011 a more satisfying year.

First, let us be more mindful of the transformative power of *berachot*, the blessings we traditionally recite throughout the day. One of the characteristics of our time is that there is so much to do, so many places to go, errands to run, so many emails to read. Just getting through it all intact is not an insignificant accomplishment. For many of us, the default position in life has been to operate largely on automatic pilot. What if we could remember to pause every so often, catch our breath, and appreciate the beauty, peace, and miracle of what is now? Our tradition encourages this in a simple but emphatic way. We may not simply, mindlessly grab a snack to eat while watching TV or surfing the

web. We must stop first and say a *bracha*, the appropriate blessing for the apple, the cup of coffee, or the piece of pastry. The blessing is different for each, so it is necessary that we pause and focus to recite the correct one, and in doing so we are reminded to be thankful for, and to fully appreciate, this small but important blessing. In fact, we are taught to recite one hundred such blessings every day—one hundred opportunities for gratitude and appreciation! This is surely a worthwhile goal for 2011 that we can at the very least strive to attain.

Second, I wish to suggest that if for any reason you have not been able for some time to be at a Friday night Kabbalat Shabbat service, make it your goal to attend one in the new year. (I know, you probably saw this one coming.) But please don't do it for me, nor for the shul. Do it only for yourself and your family. And this suggestion does not apply if you feel that every aspect of your life is now absolutely perfect just as it is. Come only if in the complexity of your life there may be some small void that needs to be filled, and please come only with an open mind, and an open heart, not expecting great earth-shaking revelations or miracles. There are unlikely to be any. But perhaps you will find yourself connecting with something worthwhile that resonates with your spirit or speaks to your soul, something that might help to make 2011 just a little better than it might otherwise be.

I could go on, but I need to work on revising and fine-tuning the rest of my own 2011 to do list. So let me offer my best wishes for a year of peace, of good health, and of 100 blessings every day!

SISTERHOOD PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Shalom Chaverim,

January brings us Tu B'Shevat. So this month I present an article from MyJewishLearning.com entitled, "Tu B'Shevat 101," reprinted without

permission:

Tu Bishvat is a holiday intimately connected to the agricultural cycle of the Land of Israel. Falling in the middle of the Jewish month of Shevat, the 15th day of the month, is the New Year of Trees. Today, this holiday is often celebrated by planting saplings and also by participating in a seder-meal that echoes the Passover seder, in which the produce of trees, including fruits and nuts, are eaten.

Ideas and Beliefs

The Bible expresses a great reverence for fruit trees as symbols of God's bounty and beneficence. Special laws were formulated to protect fruit trees in times of war and ensure that the produce of trees would not be picked until the trees were mature enough and tithes were given from them. In order to calculate the age of trees, both for determining when they could be harvested and when they were to be tithed for the Temple, the Talmudic Rabbis established the 15th day (Tu) of the month of Shevat as the official "birthday" of trees.

Subsequent to the destruction of the Temple, Tu B'Shevat lost much of its relevance, but in the middle ages it was rediscovered by Jewish mystics. In the modern period it has enjoyed another revival as a holiday that links Jews with the land of Israel and as a Jewish celebration of the environment.

Practices

When the Temple stood in Jerusalem, Tu B'Shevat served as the day on which farmers offered the first fruits of the trees they planted, after the trees had turned four years old. The following Tu B'Shevat signified when the farmers were allowed to begin making use of the produce of the trees they planted, whether for personal or economic reasons.

In the middle ages, the Jewish mystics of Safed developed a ritual meal celebrated on Tu B'Shevat that was modeled on the Passover seder. Four cups of wine were drunk and seven "fruits" symbolic of those of the Holy Land were eaten. With the rise of Zionism in the late 19th century, Tu B'Shevat was rediscovered as a celebration that links the Jews with their land. The holiday became one of rededication to the ecology of

the denuded land, with the planting of trees taking center stage in the celebration. Jews outside of Israel contribute money to plant trees there and/or plant trees in their own communities.

With the increased concern for the environment in recent years, Tu B'Shevat has taken on an additional meaning as a day on which Jews can express and act on their concern for the ecological well-being of the world in which we live. This has led to the rediscovery of the mystical Tu B'Shevat seder, now transformed into a celebration of God's bounty and the environment.

As we celebrate Tu B'Shevat, please also think about all the trees that were destroyed in the huge fire in the north of Israel, near Haifa, and please donate trees to Israel by contacting the temple office.

SHALOM - JERUSALEM CALLING TBO/BT!

The Festival of Lights here in Jerusalem is an incredible sight to see. The city completely brightens up. Instead of the typical wreaths, candy canes, and trees that are on display in cities across the USA, hanukkiot are hung from every lamppost in Jerusalem. The glow of the candles shines brightly in windows all across the city. All of the bakeries sell sufganiyot for weeks leading up to Hanukkah, and the buses even say, "Hanukkah Sameach". You can really feel the holiday spirit everywhere, and I felt it especially within the Nativ community. We gathered together Erev Hanukkah for our weekly Nativ night to make our own hanukkiot, and then we came together every night to light all 92 of them in the windows of Beit Nativ. Seeing the windows illuminated with over 800 candles on the last night was breathtaking! We spent Shabbat Hanukkah together,

by starting off with a gift exchange, and finishing the weekend with a trip to a local senior center to sing songs, eat sufganiyot, and just talk. To add to the holiday festivities, my Kibbutz track organized our own latke making party, complete with both shredded and blended latkes, loud music, and all around fun. Making latkes from scratch is a fun time, but doing it with 29 of your best friends is even better. Perhaps we threw more potatoes at each other than we ate, but overall, it was an amazing night. We capped off the holiday with a walking tour of Mea Shearim to see all of the hanukkiot fully lit. Nothing compares to Hanukkah in Jerusalem.

There's one more thing you can do: tell your friends and relatives to sign up, too. They don't have to be in the area, they just have to have a TD Bank account. Remember, the more accounts we have, the more money we raise.


