FROM THE CANTOR



It is the most Jewish of holidays and the least Jewish of holidays.

Do you know to which holiday I am referring?

If you looked at the calendar and saw that Thanksgiving is just

around the corner and chose that as your answer, you'd be correct! It is in a sense the most Jewish of holidays, in that offering thanks and expressing gratitude is so fundamentally part of our religious tradition.

The first prayer we recite in the morning upon awakening, while still in bed, is the Modeh Ani--I give thanks to You, living enduring Sovereign, for restoring my soul in compassion. You are faithful beyond measure. In this way, we pause for a moment of thanksgiving before beginning each new day.

And every moment, from morning to night, presents new opportunities for gratitude. We are instructed to recite at least 100 blessings a day, for the food we eat, upon seeing a rainbow, or wearing a new item of clothing. There is even a blessing we recite upon exiting from the bathroom! It ends with: *Blessed are you, Adonai, healer of all flesh, who sustains our bodies in wondrous ways.*

So why do I suggest that this might also be the least Jewish of holidays? It is not simply that its origins are with the Puritans of Plymouth. Rather, it is that we might rightly question the point of a one day celebration built around the idea of thanksgiving if every day, every moment, is ordained by our tradition as a time for gratitude. After all, holidays and holy days are special days because they are different. We make Shabbat special because on the prior six days we are commanded to engage in labor, and only the seventh is set aside for rest. The holiday of Sukkot that we just celebrated is special because during the rest of the year we do not dwell in booths nor take up the esrog and lulay. If every day is a day for serious thanksgiving, why celebrate Thanksgiving?

In truth, I have no problem if you choose not to make a fuss over this holiday. But it is also true that most of us, myself included, often fall short in our awareness of the gratitude we should feel each day, each moment. Our tendency is to spend more time thinking about what makes us unhappy than on what should make us glad.

And so if getting together with family or friends and cooking up a meal with all the trimmings can be an opportunity to focus on all the positive things in life, and more importantly, if it encourages us to carry gratitude with us into every other day of the year, then it is well worth making the fourth Thursday of November a holiday to celebrate.

I wish everyone a Happy Thanksgiving, and a year of joy, peace and gratitude.

Ed Leibowitz, Israel Bond Speech, 10-7-2011

There's a chill in the air, the Giants and the Jets are playing football and Ed Leibowitz is talking to us about Israel Bonds....it must be fall.

I would like to once again express my sincere appreciation to the entire congregation for giving me the opportunity to talk to you today about State of Israel Bonds. It has been my pleasure to address you for a number of years on this important subject....and you have always responded generously and made me proud.

Soliciting for Israel Bonds never gets old for me and I never have trouble finding passion to put in my words.

I learned many years ago that asking you to buy Israel Bonds is not about yield and safety. We know that the State of Israel has never defaulted on a payment and their rates of return are always competitive with similar financial instruments. Buying Israel Bonds is about our future and the future of generations to come.

Recently this community and the Jewish world lost a wonderful man, a man who taught me to never lose sight of our future.....at the age of 91, Sol Kramer passed away.....I dedicate my words today to him.

Sol was a special man, not only because he was a successful businessman and a philanthropist...but because Sol believed the most important thing we could do was make sure that our children would inherit a world where they could be safe and proud Jews. Sol survived the Holocaust and knew that teaching young people to become Jewish leaders was critical to our future. Sol and his wife Clara were instrumental in Mindy and me becoming active leaders in the Jewish world.

The lessons I learned from Sol sitting with him on the board of the Federation, the Green Lane Y and the Jewish Home for the Aged in Somerset were many.

Many years ago, I led a young men's mission to Poland and Israel. Joining me were Rabbi Zell, a dozen young men and, of course, Sol Kramer. Poland was his homeland and the country where his beloved Clara was hidden during the war. As we left Kennedy Airport, he handed me a roll of money, easily totaling in the thousands. Sol said he would take it back once we went through customs. The money was to be given to the children of the family that hid Clara. He had vowed that as long as he drew a breath, he would take care of that family. As I did not want to spend the rest of my life in the Warsaw State Penitentiary, I asked Sol "Can't we get in trouble" to which he replied "Don't worry, if we have to, will give the guard a few bucks".

We spent the next five days in Poland traveling throughout a country where Jewish life had once blossomed. All that was left of a vibrant Jewish world were the remains of concentration camps, desecrated cemeteries and old, poorly maintained buildings. I met no Jews below the age of 70. I am sure by now they are all gone. Sol would constantly show us landmarks where Jewish life had once thrived.

One night we were having a drink in a bar that had a live band. Sol went to the leader and gave him some money to play a song. He came back and said, "Watch this and see why we came here." As the band played *Hava Nagila* every eye turned toward our table. You could feel the hate. We were lucky Sol didn't want to do the *Hora* or I think we would have fought our way out the door that night.

The next day we got on an airplane for Israel. When we arrived in Israel it was like the Wizard of Oz when Dorothy landed in OZ. Everything went from bleak gray to vivid colors. Sol made us take a moment to do a *shehekiyanu* and told us that when he would be gone, it was our job to make sure that future generations would always have a free and safe Israel. We had lost Eastern Europe. We must never lose Israel.

Sol is gone now but I made a promise to him that day to always look toward the future. I am here today to keep my promise.....but I desperately need your help. I need you to invest in our future....I need you to invest in Israel. Our ongoing love of Israel and understanding what
